The Ministry

Founded as a ministry of Peachtree Baptist Church, Georgia Baptist College was born out of a burden to train godly young men and women for Christ's service. In the fall of 1980 God used Dr. David W. Dickerson to lead the congregation of Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church in Fairburn, Georgia, to establish a Bible College and Theological Seminary. Founded upon the principle of earnestly contending for the faith, Georgia Baptist College remains committed to the task of training Christian men and women spiritually and academically for Christian service. GBC began in College Park, Georgia and moved in the fall of 1999 to the rural community of Senoia, Georgia. GBC offers several programs, each aimed at developing the Christian to further the kingdom of God. At GBC academic excellence and a true commitment to the Lord Jesus are the focus.

Peachtree Baptist Academy, another ministry of Peachtree Baptist Church, was founded in 1979 as Mt. Pisgah Christian School. Though the name has changed over the years, the heart of this ministry is still dedicated to the glory of God. PBA has furnished GBC education majors with an excellent laboratory for student teaching and observation.

Heart Cry for Revival Camp Meeting is scheduled annually the second Sunday in June. This is one of the greatest ministries of Peachtree Baptist Church. This ministry provides our pastoral students with opportunities to hear some of the finest preaching in our nation. Pastors and families from all over the United States attend this weeklong conference. Every year is a genuine blessing.

Ministry opportunities abound. PBC has outreach ministries to the area children's ministries, rescue mission, jails, and local convalescent homes.

Articles of Faith

We believe in the verbal, plenary inspiration and authority of the Scriptures.

We believe in the Holy Trinity consisting of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

We believe in the deity, virgin birth, substitutionary death, and bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the doctrine of grace to describe the mercy of God for undeserving sinners.

We believe that salvation is solely by the grace of God.

- a. Christ Jesus the Lord, having died and shed His blood according to God's gracious purpose, redeemed a people to Himself.
- b. The New Birth is an effectual work of God's grace, which produces repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ.

We believe that Christians are saved to glorify God and enjoy Him forever.

We believe in a visible, personal, pretribulational, premillennial return of Jesus Christ for believers.

We believe in the responsibility for Christians to glorify the Lord in both the edification of fellow believers and the evangelism of the lost.

We believe heaven and hell are literal, everlasting, and conscious locations; heaven being reserved for believers, and hell being reserved for unbelievers.

We believe that God has ordained the local church for the perpetuation of His Word and work.

Georgia Baptist College uses only the Authorized Version of the Bible in the pulpit and in classroom instruction.

Without apology, we stand against the ecumenical movement, the modern charismatic movement, and hypercalvinism.

Philosophy of Education

The educational philosophy of Georgia Baptist College is theistic rather than humanistic. Since all wisdom begins with the infinitely wise God of the Holy Bible, education is to be based upon the Bible; centered on Jesus Christ; controlled by the Holy Spirit; related to the pupil; and socially applied. Learning is achieved through faculty lectures, discussions, student research, and practice. Only professing Christians are accepted as faculty members, instructors, and students.

Georgia Baptist College is a member of the American Federation of Christian Colleges and Schools. We have not sought accreditation by any secular accrediting association. Most accrediting agencies are humanistic rather than theistic in philosophy. It is our desire to have the approval of the Lord Jesus and His Church rather than the approval of the world.

Because it is our desire to please the Lord Jesus Christ and His church, we are committed to both academic and spiritual excellence. Many of our graduates have been accepted into graduate programs by other fine Christian graduate institutions.

To avoid government interference with the church ministries, Georgia Baptist College does not receive any state or federal funding. Tuition, individual grants, and gifts from supporting churches and individuals from around the world are used to maintain the college.

Since Georgia Baptist College is under the direct control of Peachtree Baptist Church and uses her facilities, it lives as long as it serves Baptist churches. If Georgia Baptist College ceases to be a conservative, Baptist, Bible-believing and teaching institution; it will cease to exist.

The students are mainly interested in preparing as pastors, missionaries, evangelists, Christian workers, song leaders, educational directors, Bible teachers, Christian schoolteachers, and biblical counselors.

Student Life

Location

Georgia Baptist College is located southwest of metropolitan Atlanta in Senoia, GA. Senoia is a small historical community with that "old fashioned Southern charm." The area that GBC is located in is referred to as the Peachtree Crescent. This area is presently experiencing a "boom." Economy, housing, and opportunities are blooming everywhere, which gives easy access to job options. GBC is within a 30-minute drive of Atlanta Hartsfield International Airport.

Climate

Georgia Baptist College is located in the southern portion of the Eastern Time zone. The climate is typical of most Southern states. In the summer the mid-Georgia climate is quite hot. Yet, the beauty of the land with Magnolias and muscadines is beautiful to behold.

The fall comes with a subtle beauty that reminds us of a fading flower. The warmth of the summer often carries over until October.

The winter is usually mild, yet can often reward us with the rare gift of snow. The Southern charm is again vividly portrayed through the winter blooming camellias and native azaleas. The sun is usually shining in this area of Georgia.

The winter rest gives way to a wondrous rush of life. Blossoms seem to burst from everywhere during the spring in Georgia. The area and climate in which GBC is located lends many recreational opportunities and a beautiful climate in which to enjoy them.

Spiritual Life

The emphasis at Georgia Baptist College is spiritual growth for each student and the development of their spiritual gifts. The faculty of Georgia Baptist College is very concerned that each student continues in their Christian walk and service for the Lord. College can be a difficult time to maintain one's personal prayer life and Bible studies. Teachers encourage students to spend much time in prayer and personal devotion. It is the desire of GBC and Peachtree Baptist Church to help each student develop his or her spiritual gifts for the glory of God.

Chapel Services

GBC chapel services are held once a week on Thursdays. The chapel services are not just monotonous sermons but real applicable instruction for the student's practical life. It is also a time of great spiritual refreshing.

Peachtree Baptist Church

The center of this ministry is Peachtree Baptist Church. Peachtree Baptist is an independent, fundamental, Baptist church and is committed to high moral and ethical biblical standards. PBC stands without apology for the King James Version Bible and against the charismatic movement, neoevangelicalism, ecumenicalism, hypercalvinism, and the contemporary type of services that are so prevalent today. The pastors strive to maintain a biblically balanced ministry of worship, evangelism, missions, and discipleship.

Christian Service

Georgia Baptist College provides many opportunities for student outreach. There are many weekend activities such as services at local nursing homes and homeless shelters. Child evangelism opportunities are available through PBC ministries. GBC strongly encourages participation in some form of local church outreach. This type of ministry helps to prepare the student for practical Christian living.

Student Life

Special Activities

The highlight of the fall semester is the annual Bible Conference. It is held for Peachtree Baptist Church, and all college students are required to attend. Many great preachers from all over our country are invited. Every year results in great blessings. The highlight of the spring semester is the PBC annual Missions Conference. Missionaries from all over the world are in attendance, and give students the opportunity to learn much of foreign missions. Many young people find God's will and direction for their lives during these meetings.

Automobiles

All students attending GBC must provide their own transportation. Students that have vehicles must have proof of insurance, vehicle registration, and a valid driver's license.

Standards of Conduct

Georgia Baptist College encourages all students to maintain the highest standards of Christian conduct at all times during their enrollment in GBC. Salvation by grace through faith is the initial step in becoming Christ like and maintaining acceptable behavior (Rom. 8:29). The Holy Spirit makes one conscious of the requirements of a godly life that is separated from the world (Rom. 13:8-10).

GBC has developed certain standards that are believed to help the student maintain an atmosphere that is conducive to spiritual growth. These standards are incorporated to aid in keeping the student from the influences of the world and surrendered to the Holy Spirit that dwells within (I Cor. 6:19-20). The standards include avoiding gambling, drug abuse, obscenity, attendance at movie theaters, profanity, tobacco and alcohol use, and dancing. Under penalty of expulsion, all students must abstain from the appearance of evil (See student handbook for details).

As Christians, all should strive to walk in obedience to God's Word and pray diligently for the mind of Christ. It should be our desire to glorify Christ in all that we do. "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (I Corinthians 10:3).

General Admission Requirements

How to Apply

The student is requested to submit all necessary records at least 4 weeks prior to the beginning of the semester to allow the Admissions Office time to complete each file for registration. These records include the following:

- 1. A completed application. If you need an application, please contact GBC Office of Admissions, 3867 Hwy 85 Senoia, GA 30276.
- 2. A \$40 Application Fee
- 3. A high school transcript and/or college transcript (GBC accepts only official transcripts through the mail.)
- 4. Appropriate reference letters.
- 5. An interview if requested by the Admissions Office.
- 6. SAT or ACT score report.

Transfer students

If you are transferring credits from another college, please follow these steps.

- 1. Complete all steps for first time students.
- 2. If you desire to transfer your credits from another college, please request each institution from which you want records transferred to send a complete transcript to GBC Admissions, c/o Registrar, 3867 Hwy 85 Senoia, GA 30276.
- 3. When the records are received the registrar will notify you of your standing.

Transfer Credit Guidelines

It is the practice of GBC to consider for transfer the credits earned at other regular colleges or universities. Courses must be similar in content, and must have earned a grade of at least a "C" or its equivalent. GBC retains the right to refuse credits received at any college or university that does not meet accepted reasonable standards. A student must receive at least a 2.00 grade point average or higher at GBC to complete graduation requirements. If a student desires to transfer their major to a different field, he/she must still complete a minimum of 12 hours in that field. The last 32 hours of classes must be in residence at GBC.

Early Admission

Early admission is granted only to those academically qualified students whose high school average through the eleventh grade and SAT score are above average. The Christian maturity of the applicant will also be considered.

Re-Admission

If a student decides to re-enter GBC but (1) was suspended or (2) carried a grade point average below a 2.0, his application will be reviewed by the Executive Committee.

Exceptions to Admissions

- 1. Students admitted into the Th.G. program are not required to take the ACT or the SAT.
- 2. Students lacking a high school diploma or a Government Education Diploma will be admitted to the Diploma in Theology program only. Their continuance is dependent upon satisfactory progress academically. This is <u>not</u> a degree program.

Correspondence or CLEP Courses

- 1. Credit toward a degree may be earned through recognized correspondence courses approved by the Admissions Office.
- 2. A combination of CLEP, PEP, or AP classes may be used.

Course Challenge

- 1. No Bible course may be challenged.
- 2. Permission to challenge a course must be granted by the Academic Dean or the Office of Admissions.
- 3. The student then contacts the professor and arranges to take a comprehensive final exam.
- 4. The fee is \$25 per exam, which is to be paid to the teacher.
- 5. A student cannot challenge a course, in which he has been, or is presently enrolled.
- 6. The student must score a "C" or better to receive credit.
- 7. A student cannot challenge a course which he has failed for academic reasons.
- 8. Course challenges will not meet the 32 hours residence requirement for transfer students.

Credit for Military Service

- 1. One-hour credit may be granted for every six months of active military service up to four hours.
- 2. A copy of the student's DD214 must be submitted to the Records Office before the end of the first semester.

Course Changes

To drop or add a course after registration, the student must come by the Office and pay \$10.00 for each course dropped and \$10.00 for each course added. Courses dropped by the end of the first four weeks of classes will have an honorable withdrawal and a grade of "W." Courses dropped after midterm examinations will carry a dishonorable withdrawal and a grade of "WF."

To withdraw from school, a student must come by the Admissions Office and fill out a Withdrawal Form. The school account continues until the forms are completed.

A course that does not have sufficient enrollment is subject to cancellation.

Academic Classification

Classification of students shall be according to the following minimum standards:

- 1. Part time student- a student who is enrolled for fewer than 12 hours per semester.
- 2. Full time student- a student who is enrolled for more than 12 hours per semester.
- 3. Freshman- has satisfied entrance requirements, and has completed fewer than 28 semester hours.
- 3. Sophomore- a student who has completed a minimum of 28 hours but fewer than 60 hours.
- 4. Junior- a student who has completed a minimum of 60 hours but fewer than 94 hours.
- 5. Senior a student who has completed at least 94 hours.

Attendance

Students who are enrolled for a course are expected to attend class. Students who miss the day before or after holidays are counted as double absences. Students missing one full week of classes will automatically lose one letter grade. Students who miss two full weeks or more will automatically receive an "F" for that course.

Examinations

Students are expected to take all examinations on the assigned dates. If examinations are missed due to an absence, they cannot be taken later. Absences that are doctor excused may constitute the right to reschedule exams. Arrangements must be made with the professor and a \$5.00 testing fee is to be paid at the time of exam.

Transient Credit

Students who desire to take courses for transient credit must obtain prior approval from the Registrar. Course descriptions will be necessary. Only grades above a "C" are accepted for credit.

Grading System

Grades will be issued to each student at the end of each semester. Final examinations may be taken only after an exam slip has been issued by the Office (account balance paid.). Only the final grade for the semester will be placed in the permanent record file. The following grading scale is used:

I – Incomplete. An incomplete grade may be completed within 4 weeks after the close of a semester. If the student consults with the academic dean, an extension may be granted.

W- Withdrawal with permission before a grade can be given.

WP- Withdrawal with permission while passing

WF- Withdrawal with permission while failing

S – Satisfactory. Grade given where numerical equivalents are not assigned.

U – Unsatisfactory.

Repeating a Course

A student may repeat any course that he has failed or did not meet minimum requirements. Previous grades become part of the student's permanent record. The higher grade will be used in computing grade point averages. No student may repeat a course more than twice.

Academic Load

A student should take a reduced academic load to protect his health, job efficiency, academic excellence, and his responsibilities to his church and family when he must work in order to remain in school. The following is a recommended maximum load schedule:

Scholastic Honors

The registrar will post a list of all students making a 4.0 grade point average or higher on the *President's List*, and will post a list of all students making 3.0 grade point average or higher on the *Dean's List*. The student must be carrying a minimum of 12 hours and must not receive any I's, WF's, D's, or F's during the semester.

Graduation Honors

To be eligible to receive honors the student must have made a 3.50 or higher GPA for his entire academic record completed at least 60 hours at GBC, and completed all requirements for graduation.

Graduation Requirements

Baccalaureate Degree

- 1. Students must complete at least 128 credit hours.
- 2. Students must earn at least a 2.00 GPA.
- 3. Students must receive at least a "C" in all required courses.
- 4. Students must complete at least two semesters in residency at GBC.

- 5. Students must complete their Double Major work in Bible.
- 6. Students must take one of the following exams (if applicable):

GMAT - Graduate Management Admission Test

GRE - Graduate Record Exam

NTE - National Teacher Exam

- 7. Students *must* complete a Petition for Graduation.
- 8. Settle all financial obligations to the college.

Course Numbering System

The following is a brief description of the course system. Usually 100's courses belong in the freshman category, 200's sophomore, 300's junior, 400's+ senior level.

Church Attendance

All students moving to metropolitan Atlanta to attend Georgia Baptist College are required to be members of Peachtree Baptist Church while in school. Students who live in the area and are already established in a fundamental Baptist church may remain in that local church.

Financial Information

Application Fee

A one-time application fee of \$40 is applied when the student makes their initial application. This fee should accompany the application when it is sent in to the office.

Registration Fee

A registration fee of \$30 must be paid each time a student registers for classes at Georgia Baptist College.

Tuition

The price for tuition cost is charged per semester hour. Each semester hour is \$150.00. This amount will be tallied for the student and may either be paid in full or using the payment plan. The total amount of the student's bill will be broken up each semester to help enable the student to pay off the amount by the end of the semester. There will be three payments due upon the first of each month following the start of classes. If a student is late with the monthly payment a late charge of 10% of the monthly payment will be added. In order for the student to take his exams, balances must be paid or arrangements made.

Course Descriptions for Georgia Baptist College

APPLIED CHRISTIANITY

AC 101 - Biblical Evangelism

Two Hours

A study of the scriptural basis and proper motivation for the evangelism of the lost. The student will learn that theology affects one's methodology, thus a proper theology of evangelism will be developed, so that the message and methods will be biblical. Same as **Mi 101**.

AC 102 - Introduction to Missions

Two Hours

The Great Commission as the basis for world missions, the relation of the local church to world evangelism, the definition and qualifications of a missionary, and the biblical principle of indigenous church planting will be studied. Same as **Mi 102**.

AC 105 - Prayer Two Hours

A study of the definitions, methods, purposes, hindrance and needs of prayer. The importance of praying in the Spirit, in the name of Christ, and according to the will of God will be studied, as well as the relation of faith and obedience to prayer.

AC 200 - Building a Christian Worldview

Three Hours

A study of the definition, scope, and purpose of philosophy. Major philosophical systems are presented, along with their categories, problems, and solutions, as well as an introduction to the great philosophers. A Christian worldview based on divine revelation will be compared with human wisdom. Same as **Ph 200**, **Introduction to Philosophy**.

AC 211 - Introduction to Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This course is a general introduction to the basic concepts and distinctive characteristics of biblical counseling. Students will learn what constitutes biblical counseling, the requisites to biblical counseling, the role of the counselor, and the place of biblical counseling in the ministry of the local church. The student will be exposed to secular and integration theories of psychotherapy, and see the negative effects these theories have had on our society and especially the local church. The key elements of biblical counseling will be learned and their value in promoting sanctification and biblical change. The student will also have opportunity to discuss typical counseling cases in classroom forums. Same as **Ps 211** and BC 111

AC 213 - Courtship and Marriage

Two Hours

Using the book of Ruth as a basis and the whole Bible as a reference, students will study the comparison and contrast of the biblical and secular views of courtship versus dating and the divine view of marriage. Same as **SS 213.**

AC 221 - Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance. Same as Ps 211, BC 232 and Mi 211.

AC 301 - The History of Missions

Two Hours

A survey of the history of Christian missions from NT times to the present. Emphasis will be placed on early British missions, the modern mission movement, faith missions, and missions in our day. Same as **Mi 301** and **Hi 301**.

AC 305 - Homiletics Two Hours

Instruction will be given in the preparation and delivery of sermons. The importance of preaching in the power of the Holy Spirit will be emphasized. The topical, textual, and expository sermon will be introduced with the emphasis on expository preaching. Same as **Sp** 305.

AC 306 - Expository Preaching

Two Hours

Expository preaching will be studied in more detail from the text and its exegesis to the sermon and its delivery. The student will be introduced to preaching from the various kinds of biblical literature and genre found in the Old and New Testaments. Same as **Sp 306**.

AC 317 - Ancient and Medieval Church History

Three Hours

An overview of the period of Church History from New Testament times to 1517. Special attention will be given to the Church Fathers, early heretical controversies, the Creeds, Church Councils, and the development of the Medieval Catholic Church. The existence of evangelical groups throughout this time will be noted and traced. Same as **Hi 317.**

AC 318 - Modern Church History

Three Hours

This covers Church History since the Protestant Reformation (1517 to the present). Special attention will be given to the Reformation, the Puritans, the Evangelical Awakenings, and modern theological developments. Same as **Hi 318**.

AC 332 – Pastoral Counseling

Three Hours

This course will help men called to missionary or pastoral ministry to develop a comprehensive plan to implement biblical counseling in the local church. This course is also designed for men who sense God's leadership into a biblical counseling ministry. A major part of the course will enable the student to develop a thorough program to train key leaders in the church to counsel biblically and to disciple others. Same as **Ps 323 and BC 332.**

AC 351 - Creation Science

Three Hours

Genesis 1-11 will be studied from the perspective of Young Earth Creationism, showing how this accords with scientific evidence and provides a foundation for the rest of the Scriptures and a Christian worldview. The biblical and scientific answers will be given to Naturalistic and Theistic Evolution, Uniformitarian Geology, and Old Earth Creationism. Same as **Sc 351**.

AC 400 - Pastoral Theology

Two Hours

A course designed for those preparing for the pastoral or missionary ministries. Studied will be the call to the ministry, the minister's personal and study life, and practical instruction in the mechanics of ministry, such as, baptizing, conducting the Lord's Supper, funerals, weddings, business meetings, building expansion, and other responsibilities of leadership.

AC 401 - The Family

Two Hours

A general study of the growth, development, and problems of the modern family, including the relationship of different members of the family and their social problems. Same as **SS 401**.

AC 410 - Social Ethics

Two Hours

A study of the various schools of ethical theory and the basis for a Christian ethic. Modern moral issues will be discussed from a biblical perspective. Same as **SS 410** and **Ph 410**.

AC 420 - History of Revival

Two Hours

The history of revival from its principles in the Old and New Testaments through Church History, especially centering in the Evangelical Awakenings that have come since the Reformation. Studied will be the historical backgrounds, the leaders, theology, distortions, and effects of Holy Spirit revival. Same as **Hi 420**.

BIBLICAL COUNSELING

BC 111 - Introduction to Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This course is a general introduction to the basic concepts and distinctive characteristics of biblical counseling. Students will learn what constitutes biblical counseling, the requisites to biblical counseling, the role of the counselor, and the place of biblical counseling in the ministry of the local church. The student will be exposed to secular and integration theories of psychotherapy, and see the negative effects these theories have had on our society and especially the local church. The key elements of biblical counseling will be learned and their value in promoting sanctification and biblical change. The student will also have opportunity to discuss typical counseling cases in classroom forums. Same as AC 211 and PS 211.

BC 112 - Theological Basis of Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This is a study of the theological realities that form the basis for the proper biblical approach to counseling. This includes special emphasis on the nature of God and man, the nature of sin, the doctrines of regeneration and progressive sanctification.

BC 221 – Methods of Biblical Change

Three Hours

This course is an overview of the counseling process and the elements of a biblical model to promote change in God's people. The goal is to encourage biblical thinking and procedures to help believers grow in Christ likeness. **Prerequisite: BC 111**

BC 222 - Counseling and Youth

Two Hours

This is a course to help the student understand the many problems of young people. The course will include a thorough biblical understand of youth and their problems, and a family centered approach to help them.

BC 230- Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to

their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance. Same as AC 221, Ps 211,Mi 211.

BC 231 – Premarital Counseling

Three Hours

This is a practical course to understand the importance of a good pre-marital counseling program in the local church. Students will be able to understand the imperative nature of pre-marital counseling and will review available materials and design their own pre-marital counseling course.

BC 232 Essential Qualifications of the Biblical Counselor

Two Hours

Counselors-using the biblical standards for Pastors and Deacons outlined in I Timothy 3 & Titus 1. This course will help the student to understand the Christ like character and qualities needed to be an effective biblical counselor.

BC 331 – Women Discipling Women

Three Hours

This course is designed to help women students develop and maintain a women's ministry within the local church. Topics will include a biblical definition of discipleship, the imperative of discipleship, and training in the means of discipleship. The course will present a model for meeting the specific needs of women and review the contemporary problems, which a woman counseling women might face. **Same as CE 206**.

BC 332 – Pastoral Counseling

Three Hours

This course will help men called to missionary or pastoral ministry to develop a comprehensive plan to implement biblical counseling in the local church. This course is also designed for men who sense God's leadership into a biblical counseling ministry. A major part of the course will enable the student to develop a thorough program to train key leaders in the church to counsel biblically and to disciple others. **Same as AC 332.**

BC 333 – Marriage and the Christian Family

Three Hours

A biblical study of the family from courtship to marriage, the dynamics of a Christian marriage, the roles of husbands and wives and the parental instruction and discipline of children. The student will understand God's purpose for marriage, the essentials of communication in marriage, and a biblical view of sexuality. Matters of finances, stewardship, and relationships to the local church and society will be considered. Throughout each theme, students will specifically deal with the major difficulties that trouble marriages and families.

BC 342 – Counseling and the Poetical Books

Three Hours

The course is designed to help the counselor master the topics that the poetical writers addressed that relate to the conflicts that counselees face in contemporary life. The course will enable the student to design comprehensive categorical lists that may be used in the counseling situations. This course will also help the student understand the worldview of secular man and to work with individuals who are struggling with a self-centered, and materialistic mindset.

BC 335 & BC 336 - Counseling Observations, I & II

One hour each semester

Students will observe counseling sessions in the Peachtree Baptist Counseling Ministries and discuss the methods and the materials used with various counselees. **Prerequisite: BC 111 and BC 112**

BC 411 & BC 412 – Problems and Procedures I & II

Three Hours each

This course is designed to apply the biblical principles taught in Methods of Biblical Change. Topics include, anger, fear, depression, sexual deviancy, anxiety, eating disorders, decision making, the past, self-concept, various syndromes, ADHD, medical issues in counseling, and crisis counseling. During the second semester each student will be a part of a team that will develop and present to the class a detailed biblical counseling outline for a teacher-approved counseling problem. **Prerequisite: BC 111 and BC 221.**

BC 421 & BC 422 – Counseling Practicum I & II

Two Hours each

These courses will provide the student with practical counseling experience in cooperation with Peachtree Baptist Counseling Ministries Center. The student will participate in counseling as counselors under supervisor. They will also be involved as counselors and counselees in some seminar situations. Their counseling will be analyzed from a biblical perspective with a goal of the student learning, evaluating, and sharpening practical counseling skills. **Prerequisite: BC 111, BC 221, counseling observation.**

BC 451 – NANC Membership Certification

One Hour

This course is designed to prepare the student to sit the theological and counseling exams required for certification with the National Association of Nouthetic Counselors. Georgia Baptist College recommends our Biblical Counseling majors pursue NANC certification.

BIBLE

Bi 101 - Old Testament Survey

Three Hours

A survey of the Old Testament from the Creation to the post-Exilic Period. Special emphasis is given to the first chapters of Genesis and the history of Israel.

Bi 102 - New Testament Survey

Three Hours

Overview of the political, social, moral, and religious background of the New Testament. Authorship, date and occasion of writing, theme and purpose of each book are explored. Special emphasis is given to certain books.

Bi 103 - Bible Study and Interpretation

Two Hours

A course in how to study and interpret the Bible, a combination of hermeneutics and practical methods of Bible study.

Bi 201 - Pentateuch Three Hours

A study of the first five books of the Old Testament. The historical and cultural context will be examined with the theology of each book, emphasizing the truths that are foundational to the rest of the Word of God.

Bi 202 - Historical Books

Three Hours

An overview of the books from Joshua through Esther. The historical and cultural context will be examined and the theology and practical value of the divine history will be stressed.

Bi 205 - Elemental Theology I

Three Hours

Introductory study of basic Bible doctrines, covering the Bible, God, the Trinity, the Person and Work of Christ, the Holy Spirit, Angels, Satan, Demons, and Salvation.

Bi 206 - Elemental Theology II

Three Hours

Further coverage of basic Bible doctrines: the Christian life, the Church, Life after Death, the Second Coming of Christ, Hell, and the Eternal Glory of the Saints.

Bi 205 and **206** are not a part of the Pastoral Studies or Christian Ministries majors or Bible majors with minors in Missions or Biblical Languages.

Bi 210 - Apologetics

Three Hours

The development of a biblical philosophy concerning the rational defense of the Christian faith. The evidential and presuppositional approaches will the compared and evaluated. The questions of the existence of God, the inspiration of the Bible, the historicity of Jesus Christ and His resurrection, and actuality of miracles will be addressed. Opposing worldviews, such as Naturalism, relativism, and anti-biblical theism will answered. Same as **Ph 210**.

Bi 212 - Apostolic Age

Two Hours

The course is an exposition of the book of Acts in its setting in the first century world and its relation to the NT epistles of Paul.

Bi 301 - Life of Christ Three Hours

A study of the life of Christ, using a harmony of the Gospels approach, yet noting the distinctive features of each book.

Bi 302 - Prophetic Books

Three Hours

A study of the prophets and prophecy, giving an overview study of the OT Major and Minor Prophets (except Daniel). Emphasis will be placed on the book of Isaiah.

Bi 304 - Poetical Books

Three Hours

The course will examine the nature and interpretation of Hebrew poetry and give an overview of the books of Job through Song of Solomon.

Bi 310 - Romans Two Hours

A detailed study of the epistle of Paul to the Romans with special emphasis on its teaching on Soteriology.

Bi 312 - 1 and 2 Corinthians

Two Hours

The Corinthian epistles are expounded with application to the issues in the churches of our day.

Bi 315 - Galatians through 2 Thessalonians

Three Hours

These epistles will be expounded with an emphasis on the Pauline doctrine of our union with Christ in the Body of Christ and the future hope of the Church in the Coming of Christ.

Bi 317 - Systematic Theology I

Three Hours

After introducing the science of theology, the doctrines of the Bible (Bibliology), God (Theology Proper), and Angels (Angelology) will be studied. Required for Pastoral Studies and Christian Ministries majors and Bible majors with minors in Missions or Biblical Languages.

Bi 318 - Systematic Theology II

Three Hours

This semester covers the doctrines of the Holy Spirit (Pneumatology) and Christ (Christology). Required for Pastoral Studies and Christian Ministries majors and Bible majors with Missions or Biblical Languages minors

Bi 320 - Hebrews and the General Epistles

Three Hours

The epistles from Hebrews through Jude will be studied with their application to the believer.

Bi 401 - Daniel/Revelation

Two Hours

The Old and New Testament prophetic books of Daniel and Revelation are studied. Their relationship will be noted and importance to the Premillennial position on Eschatology.

Bi 405 - Historical Theology

Three Hours

A study of the progress of theological dogma as developed in the understanding of the professing Church through history. Heretical controversies will be examined, and the development of various traditional theologies will be noted. Same as **Ph 405**.

Bi 410 - Baptist History and Distinctives

Three Hours

The doctrine of the Church (Ecclesiology) is studied with an emphasis on the doctrines distinctive to Baptists, as well as a survey of Baptist History. Required for all degree programs. Same as **Hi 410**.

Bi 470 - Systematic Theology III

Three Hours

The doctrines of Man (Anthropology), Sin (Hamartiology), and Salvation (Soteriology) will be studied. The Doctrines of Grace will be emphasized. Required for all degree programs.

Bi 448 - Systematic Theology IV

Three Hours

The doctrine of Last Things (Eschatology) will be taught, including Death and the Afterlife, the Second Coming of Christ, and the final state of the Saved and the Lost.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

CE 200 - Introduction to Christian Education

Three Hours

An introduction into the history, philosophy, aims, objectives, and curriculum of the education ministries of the church.

CE 201 - History and Philosophy of Christian Schools

Three Hours

A study of the rise of the Christian School movement and an exposition of the Christian philosophy of education in contrast to secular education in the public government schools. Same as **Ed 201** and **Ph 201**.

CE 202 - Child Growth and Development

Three Hours

A study of the processes involved in the normal development from childhood to adolescence, including the physical, emotional, mental, spiritual, and social. Character development is addressed and the effects of heredity. Same as **Ed 202**, **Ps 202**, and **SS 202**.

CE 203 - Christian Education of Children

Two Hours

A study of the church program for children, evangelism of children, and methods and materials for reaching this age group.

CE 205 - Introduction to Youth Work

Three Hours

Focus is on the modern teen-ager, his motivations, and culture. The history of youth organizations and presentation of successful programs will be studied.

CE 206 Women Discipling Women

Three Hours

This course is designed to help women students develop and maintain a women's ministry within the local church. Topics will include a biblical definition of discipleship, the imperative of discipleship, and training in the means of discipleship. The course will present a model for meeting the specific needs of women and review the contemporary problems, which a woman counseling women might face. **Same as BC 331.**

CE 301 - Methods and Principles of Christian Education

Three Hours

An outline of principles of teaching as fundamental to effective and productive administration of Christian Education ministries and activities. Principles of learning necessary to assimilation of information and efficient application to life and Christianity will be covered.

CE 306 - Christian Education of Adults

Three Hours

A course on the characteristics, needs, and problems of adults, and the total church program of adult education. Methods and materials of adult work are examined and evaluated. Methods for working with all ages of adults will be discussed.

CE 307 - Sunday School Administration

Two Hours

A study of the total program of organization, administration, and outreach of the Sunday School. The requirements, qualifications, duties, and training of teachers and leaders, as well as the role of the pastor, Christian Education director, and Sunday School superintendent are examined.

CE 402 - Organization and Administration of a Christian Day School Three Hours

Principles of organization and administration of a Christian School are explored. Purpose, goals, problems, and practical information are given as to the everyday working of a Christian Day School.

CE 411 - Teaching Bible in Church and School

Two Hours

A practical course in the steps in the education process, the seven laws of learning, the teaching methods of Christ, and the application of these principles in a local church or school. Same as **EE/SE 411**.

CE 428 - Curriculum Development

Three Hours

A study of the general principles of curriculum building for a total church Christian education program. Materials for the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Leadership Training Program, Weekday Clubs, etc., will be analyzed.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

CS 101 - Introduction to Microcomputers

Two Hours

Basic instruction in computers with introduction to word processing, spreadsheets, data base, and graphics.

CS 202 - Introduction to Programming

Two Hours

Introduction to the data and control structures found in programming languages.

CS 303 - Computers in Education

Two Hours

This course includes a study of beneficial computer applications for education. Students will learn how to evaluate and obtain different types of computer software and hardware. Same as **Ed 303.**

EDUCATION

General Education

Ed 101 - Introduction to Education

Two Hours

Introduced will be the objectives to education; organizations, curricula, support, administration, and control in elementary, secondary, vocational, and higher divisions; educational personnel and professional relationships; and opportunities in the field of education.

Ed 201 - History and Philosophy of Christian Schools

Three Hours

A study of the rise of the Christian School movement and an exposition of the Christian philosophy of education in contrast to secular education in the public government schools. Same as **CE 201** and **Ph 201**.

Ed 202 - Child Growth and Development

Three Hours

A study of the processes involved in the normal development from childhood to adolescence, including the physical, emotional, mental, spiritual, and social. Character development is addressed and the effects of heredity. Same as CE 202, Ps 202, and SS 202

Ed 203, 303, 403 - Education Field Experience

One Hour

Educational Field Experience enables students to receive credit for participating in a teaching experience one summer during their enrollment as an education major. Participation in a youth group, Sunday School, or summer school may be accepted.

Ed 301 - Educational Psychology

Three Hours

The course applies psychology to education. The topic of learning is studied through the investigation of the learner's development mentally, physically, spiritually, and socially.

Theories of learning are compared and contrasted with a Christian philosophy of education. Same as **Ps 301**.

Ed 302 - Introduction to Exceptional Children

Three Hours

An overview of many childhood exceptionalities and a biblical approach to educating these children. Same as **Ps 302**.

Ed 303 - Computers in Education

Two Hours

This course includes a study of beneficial computer applications for education. Students will learn how to evaluate and obtain different types of computer software and hardware. Same as **PS 303**.

Ed 310 - Education Practicum

Two Hours

A course designed to expose the education major to practical experience in the Christian school under the supervision of a supervisor or classroom teacher. A minimum of 45 hours over 10 consecutive school days is required working in an actual teaching responsibility. May be done within a school semester or in an interterm in a school in the vicinity of the student's home.

Ed 410 - Tests and Measures

One Hour

Study of the types and ways of testing as an evaluation of learning along with an examination of other informal methods of appraisal. Student studies are performed on various standardized tests.

Ed 415 - Adolescent Growth and Development

Three Hours

This study is limited to the examining of the adolescent progression. An overview will include such topics relevant to the adolescent as decision making, home, church, society, puberty, dating, interpersonal relationships, discipline, and self-control. Same as **Ps 415** and **SS 415**.

Ed 416 - Education Seminar

One Hour

The student will attend the annual Education Seminar and will receive one credit hour after the seminar summary is turned in to the Dean of Education

Elementary Education

EE 201 - Materials and Methods

Three Hours

Introductory course explaining the aims, materials, and methods used in teaching elementary grades. The practical skills and techniques needed by the elementary school teacher will be emphasized. Operation of visual-aid equipment will be learned and mastered.

EE 311 - Teaching Science and History

Two Hours

The basic tools for teaching science and history are introduced with the basic concepts of history and science being presented and reviewed.

EE 312 - Teaching Math

Three Hours

A study of the different concepts and methods used to teach mathematics with an overview of types of materials used in teaching.

EE 313 - Teaching Reading

Three Hours

The course is designed to give the elementary teacher the skills necessary to teach students reading via the intensive phonics approach, with an introduction to types of children's literature.

EE 400 - Teaching Health and Physical Education

Two Hours

Basic health practices and taught along with a focus on a beneficial and practical physical education curriculum. Topics will include fitness, legal liabilities, rules for sports, and discipline as applied to physical education.

EE 410 - Children's Literature

Two Hours

Interpretive and critical study of literature suitable for children. For Education Majors. Same as En 410.

EE 411 - Teaching Bible in Church and School

Two Hours

A practical course in the steps in the education process, the seven laws of learning, the teaching methods of Christ, and the application of these principles in a local church or school. Same as **CE/SE 411.**

EE 412 - Teaching Language Arts

Two Hours

An introduction to the many facets of teaching elementary language arts, including introduction to teaching spelling, writing, and composition.

EE 414 - Elementary Teaching Internship

Eight Hours

This is at least a one semester of in-service training under the direct supervision of either a classroom teacher or supervisor. Must be approved by Supervisor.

EE 421 - Teaching Art and Music

Three Hours

A course that acquaints the student with the principle theories, procedures, and basic material necessary to the teaching of classroom art and music.

Secondary Education

SE 300 - Secondary School Curriculum

Three Hours

A foundational course of practical teaching skills for the secondary education major. It introduces the principles, and methodology needed for basic instruction.

SE 301 - Teaching English

Two Hours

A basic introduction to English for the secondary school teacher. A materials and methods course for the teaching of English.

SE 303 - Teaching History

Two Hours

A basic introduction to materials and methods for teaching history in the secondary school.

SE 304 - Teaching Mathematics

Two Hours

A basic introduction to materials and methods for teaching mathematics in the secondary school.

SE 305 - Teaching Social Studies

Two Hours

A basic introduction to materials and methods for teaching social studies in the secondary school.

SE 306- Teaching Music

Two Hours

A basic intro to materials and methods for teaching music in secondary school.

SE 411 - Teaching Bible in Church and School

Two Hours

A practical course in the steps in the education process, the seven laws of learning, the teaching methods of Christ, and the application of these principles in a local church or school. Same as **CE/EE 411**.

SE 412 - Adolescent Literature

Two Hours

Interpretive and critical study of literature suitable for adolescents. For Education Majors. Same as **EN 412**.

SE 414 - Secondary Teaching Internship

Six Hours

This is at least a one semester of in-service training under the direct supervision of either a classroom teacher or supervisor. Must be approved by the Department of Education.

ENGLISH

En 099 - English Fundamentals

Three Hours

A one semester study of English grammar required of freshmen that score less than 18 on the ACT or 400 on the SAT examinations. The student must pass this class with a grade of "C" or better to go on to En 101. The class will not count toward the minimum English requirements.

En 101, 102 - English Grammar/Composition

Three Hours each Semester

A brief review of grammar and usage, but main emphasis is centered on paragraph and essay writing. Second semester is a continuation of different types of writing, critical analysis, and the research paper. **En 101** and **102** must be taken in proper sequence and passed with a minimum grade of "C" in each semester. The student must pass this class with a grade of "C" or better to go on the any other English course.

En 201, 202 - British/American Literature

Three Hours each Semester

A survey of the most interesting British and American writers from the early years to the present. A Christian worldview of literature is taught in appreciating and critiquing literature.

En 301 - Creative Writing

Three Hours

The student studies and practices the tools of effective writing and is encouraged to apply them in areas of his own personal interest. Attention is given to poetry, characterization, and other forms of imaginative writing.

En 306 - Advanced Grammar and Composition

Three Hours

A detailed study of the grammatical structure of the English language and the elements of formal writing.

En 310 - Victorian Literature

Three Hours

An examination of selective prose and poetry from English literature from 1837 to 1901, with special attention given to Robert Browning, Alfred Lord Tennyson, and Matthew Arnold.

En 320 - Introduction to Journalism

Three Hours

A practical introduction to journalism with emphasis on Christian writing. The student focuses on research and writing of factual articles.

En 330 - American Romanticism

Three Hours

A study of the romantic philosophy found in the writings of Emerson, Thoreau, Melville, Poe, and Whitman.

En 340 - Shakespeare

Three Hours

Studied are the essentials of William Shakespeare's life and times and some of his plays and sonnets.

En 350 - The American Novel

Three Hours

The development of the American novel is studied through the works of Hawthorne, Melville, Howells, James, Cather, Fitzgerald, Hemingway, and others.

En 401 - The British Novel

Three Hours

The historical development of the English novel is studied, giving special attention to the works of Austen, Dickens, Eliot, Hardy, and C. S. Lewis.

En 410 - Children's Literature

Two Hours

Interpretive and critical study of literature suitable for children. For Education Majors. Same as **EE 410**.

En 412 - Adolescent Literature

Two Hours

Interpretive and critical study of literature suitable for adolescents. For Education Majors. Same as **SE 412**.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES New Testament Greek

FL 301, 302 - Elementary Greek

Three Hours each Semester

A study of the Greek language of the New Testament, including vocabulary, forms, syntax, and translation. The student will be introduced to translating the New Testament. *The student must pass these classes with a grade of "C" or better to go on the FL 401*.

FL 401 - Intermediate Greek

Three Hours

Deeper study of grammar and syntax with application to the exegesis of the Greek New Testament. The student must pass this class with a grade of "C" or better to go on to FL 402.

FL 402 - Exegesis of Galatians

Three Hours

The Epistle of Paul to the Galatians will be exegeted and translated using the insights and tools learned in Intermediate Greek. *The student must pass this course with a grade of "C" or better to go on to any exegesis course.*

FL 410 - Romans in the Greek New Testament

Three Hours

Exegesis of the Epistle to the Romans with study of syntax and vocabulary.

FL 420 - Philippians and Colossians in the Greek New Testament

Three Hours

Exegesis of the Epistles of Philippians and Colossians with the study of syntax and vocabulary.

Other New Testament books will be covered, as there is demand.

Old Testament Hebrew

FL 411 - Elementary Hebrew

Four Hours

A fundamental study of the elements of Classical Hebrew vocabulary, word forms, grammar, and reading. The student must pass this course with a grade of "C" or better to go on to any exegesis course.

FL 412- Intermediate Hebrew

Three Hours

A study of Hebrew syntax using an interactive approach to Jonah and Ruth.

FL 413 - Exegesis of Micah

Three Hours

An exegesis of the prophecy of Micah, using the basics learned in Elementary Hebrew.

HISTORY

Hi 101, 102 - History of Civilization

Three Hours each Semester

The course gives a broad coverage of major political, military, sociological, and cultural developments in the history of civilization. The Christian approach to history is given special attention. Hi 101 covers from the first recorded history up to AD 1660; Hi 102 from 1660 to the present.

Hi 201, 202 - United States History

Three Hours each Semester

The course covers American history from the Colonial Period to the present. Hi 201 covers the period through 1876; Hi 202 from 1876 to the present. Emphasis will be placed on the features that encouraged free enterprise, nationalism, and the Christian faith.

Hi 210 - World Geography

Three Hours

The study of man in relation to his physical, cultural, economic, and political structures in the various regions of the world. Same as SS 210.

Hi 301 - The History of Missions

Two Hours

A survey of the history of Christian missions from NT times to the present. Emphasis will be placed on early British missions, the modern mission movement, faith missions, and missions in our day. Same as AC 301 and Mi 301.

Hi 317 - Ancient and Medieval Church History

Three Hours

An overview of the period of Church History from New Testament times to 1517. Special attention will be given to the Church Fathers, early heretical controversies, the Creeds, Church Councils, and the development of the Medieval Catholic Church. The existence of evangelical groups throughout this time will be noted and traced. Same as **AC 317.**

Hi 318 - Modern Church History

Three Hours

This covers Church History since the Protestant Reformation (1517 to the present). Special attention will be given to the Reformation, the Puritans, the Evangelical Awakenings, and modern theological developments. Same as **AC 318**.

Hi 320 - History of Philosophy

Three Hours

The history of the development of human thought from the early Greek nature philosophers to Classic Greek Philosophy, Medieval and Modern Philosophy. Influential thinkers will be noted, the various schools of thought, and their comparison to the Christian worldview. Same as **Ph 320**.

Hi 405 - History of Religion in America

Three Hours

A study of the background and historical development of Christianity in America from the early colonies to the present. Spiritual Awakenings and major denominations will be noted, along with other religious groups. Same as **SS 405**.

Hi 410 - Baptist History and Distinctives

Three Hours

The doctrine of the Church (Ecclesiology) is studied with an emphasis on the doctrines distinctive to Baptists as well as a survey of Baptist History. Same as **Bi 410**.

Hi 420 - History of Revival

Two Hours

The history of revival from its principles in the Old and New Testaments through Church History, especially centering in the Evangelical Awakenings that have come since the Reformation. Studied will be the historical backgrounds, the leaders, theology, distortions, and effects of Holy Spirit revival. Same as **AC 420**.

MATHEMATICS

Ma 099 - Introduction to Mathematics

Two Hours

A remedial course designed for students lacking the proper background for algebra or science requirements. The student must pass this class with a grade of "C" or better to go on to any mathematics or science classes (except Sc 351). The class does not count toward the mathematics requirement.

Ma 101 - College Math

Three Hours

An arithmetic-based course emphasizing application problem solving. Real numbers, ratios, percents, formulas, statistics, and other topics of interest to consumers will be examined.

Ma 102 - College Algebra I

Three Hours

The study of exponents, radicals, rational expressions, linear and quadratic equations, inequalities, systems of equations, and applications. Prerequisite **Ma 099** or math placement test.

Ma 201 - College Algebra II

Three Hours

Functions, graphing techniques, and applications will be studied. Prerequisite **Ma 102** or two years of high school algebra and a placement test.

Ma 203 - Mathematics for the Secondary School

Two Hours

A course which reviews the topics in general mathematics and algebra courses taught in the secondary school and emphasizes concept preparation and techniques of skill mastery.

Ma 301 - College Trigonometry

Three Hours

Study of various methods of solving triangular problems, demonstrated through investigations of identity and simple equation solutions. Exponential and logarithmic functions, matrices, sequences, and probability are discussed. Prerequisite: **Ma 201**.

Ma 302 - Calculus I Four Hours

An introduction to analytical geometry, functions, limits and differentiation of algebraic functions, and applications. Prerequisite: **Ma 201** or placement test score, or ACT scores.

Ma 303 -Linear Algebra

Three Hours

Introduction to vectors, vector functions, linear functions, solutions to linear systems of equations, matrices, determinants, and eigenvalues.

Ma 401 - Calculus II Four Hours

Continuation of **Ma 302**, dealing with definite integration, differentiation and integration of transcendental functions and other algebraic curves, and applications.

Ma 402 - Calculus III Four Hours

A continuation of **Ma 401**, moving to polar coordinates, solid analytical geometry, parametric equations, improper integrals, and Maclaurin and Taylor series.

Ma 403 - Calculus IV Four Hours

A continuation of **Ma 402**, studying the functions of more than one variable, partial differentiation, multiple integrals, vector analysis, and theorems of Green and Stokes.

Ma 410 - College Geometry

Three Hours

An introduction to advanced Euclidean geometry, dealing with circles, constructions, loci, polygons, triangles, congruence, and applications. Prerequisite: **Ma 301.**

MISSIONS

Mi 101 - Biblical Evangelism

Two Hours

A study of the Scriptural basis and proper motivation for the evangelism of the lost. The student will learn that theology affects one's methodology, thus a proper theology of evangelism will be developed, so that the message and methods will be biblical. Same as **AC 101.**

Mi 102 - Introduction to Missions

Two Hours

The Great Commission as the basis for world missions, the relation of the local church to world evangelism, the definition and qualifications of a missionary, and the biblical principle of indigenous church planting will be studied. Same as **AC 102**.

Mi 203, 303, 403 - Missionary Practicum

One Hour

This course involves the student visiting a mission field for at least 10-14 days, observing and laboring with missionaries, and producing a writing project relating to the experience and a journal of interviews with the missionaries. Academic approval must be secured before the student makes the visit.

Mi 210 - Missionary Practicum

One to Three Hours

The course involves the student visiting a mission field for at least 6-8 weeks, observing and laboring with missionaries, and producing a writing project relating to the experience and a journal of interviews with the missionaries. Credit will depend on the time, responsibility, and work involved. Academic approval must be secured before the students makes the visit.

Mi 221 - Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance. Same as AC 211, BC 232, and Ps 211.

Mi 301 - The History of Missions

Two Hours

A survey of the history of Christian missions from NT times to the present. Emphasis will be placed on early British missions, the modern mission movement, faith missions, and missions in our day. Same as AC 301 and Hi 301

Mi 310 - Principles and Methods of Missions

Two Hours

The courses cover the process of a missionary candidate, including commissioning from the local church, choice of a mission board, deputation, preparation for the field spiritually, physically, and financially. Practical projects will be undertaken, such as the making of prayer cards, prayer letters, slide presentations, and display boards.

Mi 320 - Principles and Methods of Missions

Two Hours

The life and ministry of the missionary on the field of labor will be studied, such as principles of church planting, including such specialized ministries as medical work, educational ministries, literature production and distribution, radio outreach, camp ministries, and translation.

Mi 420 - Cultural Anthropology

Three Hours

A study of the cultures of various people of the world to prepare the missionary candidate to life and ministry among them. Issues of cross-cultural communication of the gospel will be addressed. Same as **SS 420**.

MUSIC

Mu 101 - Introduction to Music

Two Hours

Introduction to the scales, intervals, and chord structures as well as song leading. A Christian philosophy of music will be taught.

Mu 102 - Song Leading

Two Hours

A study of the techniques of gospel song leadership in relation to the congregation and to the choir. The fundamentals of music that are necessary to being an effective song leader and the procedures in interpretation and choral work are taught.

Mu 103-404 - College Choir

One Hour (each)

The College Choir prepares for singing in the church or representing the college elsewhere. Students will sharpen their skills in sight reading and choral singing.

PHILOSOPHY

Ph 200 - Introduction to Philosophy

Three Hours

A study of the definition, scope, and purpose of philosophy. Major philosophical systems are presented, along with their categories, problems, and solutions, as well as an introduction to the great philosophers. A Christian worldview based on divine revelation will be compared with human wisdom. Same as **AC 200**, **Building a Christian Worldview**.

Ph 201 - History and Philosophy of Christian Schools

Three Hours

A study of the rise of the Christian School movement and an exposition of the Christian philosophy of education in contrast to secular education in the public government schools. Same as **CE 201** and **Ed 201**.

Ph 210 - Apologetics

Three Hours

The development of a biblical philosophy concerning the rational defense of the Christian faith. The evidential and presuppositional approaches will the compared and evaluated. The questions of the existence of God, the inspiration of the Bible, the historicity of Jesus Christ and His resurrection, and actuality of miracles will be addressed. Opposing worldviews, such as Naturalism, relativism, and anti-biblical theism will answered. Same as **Bi 210**.

Ph 301 - Logic Three Hours

The study of deductive and inductive reasoning, conditions of proof, introduction to the laws of thought, and the process of the scientific method. The purpose is to produce a thinking Christian.

Ph 320 - History of Philosophy

Three Hours

The history of the development of human thought from the early Greek nature philosophers to Classic Greek Philosophy, Medieval and Modern Philosophy. Influential thinkers will be noted, the various schools of thought, and their comparison to the Christian worldview. Same as **Hi 320**.

Ph 405 - Historical Theology

Three Hours

A study of the progress of theological dogma as developed in the understanding of the professing Church through history. Heretical controversies will be examined, and the development of various traditional theologies will be noted. Same as **Bi 405**.

Ph 410 - Social Ethics Two Hours

A study of the various schools of ethical theory and the basis for a Christian ethic. Modern moral issues will be answered. Same as **AC 410** and **SS 410**.

PSYCHOLOGY

Ps 201 - General Psychology

Three Hours

Conditions and facts of conscious behavior are studied, including its physiological basis, personality, emotions, feelings, sensations, learning, habits, memory, and perceptions. Psychological theories are compared and contrasted with a biblical worldview.

Ps 202 - Child Growth and Development

Three Hours

A study of the processes involved in the normal development from childhood to adolescence, including the physical, emotional, mental, spiritual, and social. Character development is addressed and the effects of heredity. Same as **Ed 202**, **CE 202**, and **SS 202**.

Ps 211 - Introduction to Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This course is a general introduction to the basic concepts and distinctive characteristics of biblical counseling. Students will learn what constitutes biblical counseling, the requisites to biblical counseling, the role of the counselor, and the place of biblical counseling in the ministry of the local church. The student will be exposed to secular and integration theories of psychotherapy, and see the negative effects these theories have had on our society and especially the local church. The key elements of biblical counseling will be learned and their value in promoting sanctification and biblical change. The student will also have opportunity to discuss typical counseling cases in classroom forums. **Same as AC 211 and BC 111.**

Ps 221 - Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance. Same as AC 211, BC 232 and Mi 211.

Ps 301 - Educational Psychology

Three Hours

The course applies psychology to education. The topic of learning is studied through the investigation of the learner's development mentally, physically, spiritually, and socially. Theories of learning are compared and contrasted with a Christian philosophy of education. Same as **Ed 301**.

Ps 302 Introduction to Exceptional Children

Three Hours

An overview of many childhood exceptionalities and a biblical approach to educating these children. Same as **Ed 302**.

Ps 415 - Adolescent Growth and Development

Three Hours

This study is limited to the examining of the adolescent progression. An overview will include such topics relevant to the adolescent as decision making, home, church, society, puberty, dating, interpersonal relationships, discipline, and self-control. Same as **Ed 415** and **SS 415**.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PE 101 - First Aid and Disaster Education

Two Hours

A course in first aid measures for wounds and other bodily injuries and CPR techniques.

PE 201 - Hygiene and Physical Fitness

Two Hours

A course emphasizing the development of hygienic living and sound health habits. A personal emphasis and practical application of health habits and exercise routine for the student's physical wellbeing.

SCIENCE

Sc 101 - Biological Science Survey

Three Hours

A course to give the student a basis in biological science. Focus will be placed on plant biology, the human anatomy and physiology.

Sc 102 - Physical Science Survey

Three Hours

A course to give the student a basis in the physical sciences: physics, geology, astronomy, and meteorology.

Sc 351 - Creation Science

Three Hours

Genesis 1-11 will be studied from the perspective of Young Earth Creationism, showing how this accords with scientific evidence and provides a foundation for the rest of the Scriptures and a Christian worldview. The biblical and scientific answers will be given to Naturalistic and Theistic Evolution, Uniformitarian Geology, and Old Earth Creationism. Same as **AC 351**.

SOCIAL STUDIES

SS 102 - Personal Money Management

Two Hours

Survey of fundamental principles of general and related economic concepts from the viewpoint of the consumer. Topics studied are personal budgeting, consumer buying, the use of credit, insurance, real estate, investments, personal income tax, banking, and estate planning.

SS 202 - Child Growth and Development

Three Hours

A study of the processes involved in the normal development from childhood to adolescence, including the physical, emotional, mental, spiritual, and social. Character development is addressed and the effects of heredity. Same as **Ed 202**, **CE 202**, and **Ps 202**.

SS 210 - World Geography

Three Hours

The study of man in relation to his physical, cultural, economic, and political structures in the various regions of the world. Same as **Hi 210.**

SS 401 - The Family

Two Hours

A general study of the growth, development, and problems of the modern family, including the relationship of different members of the family and their social problems. Same as **AC 401**.

SS 405 -History of Religion in America

Three Hours

A study of the background and historical development of Christianity in America from the early colonies to the present. Spiritual Awakenings and major denominations will be noted, along with other religious groups. Same as **Hi 405**.

SS 410 - Social Ethics Two Hours

A study of the various schools of ethical theory and the basis for a Christian ethic. Modern moral issues will be discussed from a biblical perspective. Same as **AC 410** and **Ph 410**.

SS 415 - Adolescent Growth and Development

Three Hours

This study is limited to the examining of the adolescent progression. An overview will include such topics relevant to the adolescent as decision making, home, church, society, puberty, dating, interpersonal relationships, discipline, and self-control. Same as **Ed 415** and **Ps 415**.

SS 420 - Cultural Anthropology

Three Hours

A study of the cultures of various people of the world and how they affect individual behavior. Issues of cross-cultural communication of the gospel will be addressed. Same as **Mi 420.**

SPEECH

Sp 101 - Fundamentals of Speech

Three Hours

A general course in the art of speaking with emphasis on voice production, voice development, basics of platform manner, and practice in presenting various types of speeches.

Sp 305 - Homiletics Two Hours

Instruction will be given in the preparation and delivery of sermons. The importance of preaching in the power of the Holy Spirit will be emphasized. The topical, textual, and expository sermon will be introduced with the emphasis on expository preaching. Same as **AC 305**.

Sp 306 - Expository Preaching

Two Hours

Expository preaching will be studied in more detail from the text and its exegesis to the sermon and its delivery. The student will be introduced to preaching from the various kinds of biblical literature and genre found in the Old and New Testaments. Same as **AC 306**.

Graduate School of Education

OUR EMPHASIS

Georgia Baptist Theological Seminary's goal is the glorification of our Lord Jesus Christ in the equipping of His servants for the gospel ministry. Our heart core curriculum is sound theology, for the worship and methodology of the Church reflects its theology, or lack thereof. We teach the doctrines of grace without compromise, for we believe it is the biblical gospel. The need of the hour is a reformation in doctrine if the Church is to experience true and lasting revival.

GBTS seeks to emphasize also the necessity of expository preaching, which will necessitate the student having a grasp of the biblical languages and tools to do sound exegesis of the Scriptures. Course Descriptions for Georgia Baptist Theological Seminary

BIBLICAL COUNSELING

BC 501- Introduction to Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This course is a basic introduction to biblical counseling distinctives, and techniques. Students will discuss how the Scriptures and Theology form the foundation and essential elements for biblical counseling as contrasted to secular humanistic counseling. The dangers of pop Christian psychology which integrates secular psychology and religion are exposed. Emphasis is placed upon the role of counseling in the ministry of the local church and the biblical qualifications of a counselor.

BC 502- Methods of Biblical Change

Two Hours

The goal of biblical counseling is to encourage and develop biblical thinking which leads to one's changing into Christ likeness. This course provides a comprehensive study of the counseling process including the methodological model for encouraging biblical change. Prerequisite BC 501

BC 511- Theological Foundation of Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

The course is designed to relate the main theological themes of the Christian faith so one can form a proper approach to biblical counseling. This course places special emphasis on the theological truths concerning the nature of God, man, and sin. The realities of regeneration, and progressive sanctification are taught along with the doctrine of the local church in the ministry of biblical counseling.

BC 519- Biblical Counseling and the Poetical Books

Three Hours

This course is designed to help the counselor learn how to use the Poetical Books as a means of encouraging, instructing, correcting, and comforting counselees who struggle with such life conflicts as materialistic thinking, physical and mental suffering, bereavement, injustices and other life conflicts.

BC 541- Marriage and Family Counseling

Three Hours

In the majority of counseling cases there will be marriage, family and parenting issues. This course addresses the biblical basis and purposes of marriage, roles of husbands/wives, the imperative of family communications, parenting and child training from a biblical counseling prospective. Included in the course are discussions of how to resolve family conflicts in a biblical manor.

BC 602 - Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance. Same as PS 602

BC 611- Women Discipling Women

Three Hours

This course is for women majoring in biblical counseling and addresses the development of a women's ministry within the local church that will provide a biblical discipleship program for women. Topics will include specific counseling problems common to women such as the feminist influence, modesty issues, misrepresentations about submission, the role of women in the local church, idolatrous emotional attachments, bitterness, unforgiving spirit, not having a gentle and quiet spirit and keys to developing family unity and communication skills.

BC 612- Pastoral Counseling

Three Hours

This course will help men called to pastoral or biblical counseling ministry to develop a comprehensive plan to implement biblical counseling in the local church. A major part of the course will enable the student to develop a thorough program to train key leaders in the church to counsel biblically and to disciple others. **Same as PS 703.**

BC 621- Counseling Practicum and Observation

Three Hours

This course addresses the practical applications of the principles of biblical counseling and the different methodological aspects of the counseling process. The course includes the student's involvement in counseling with and observing a biblical counselor in actual counseling sessions. The purpose of this course is to help the students learn, evaluate and sharpen their practical counseling skills from observing a biblical counselor in action. **Prerequisite BC 501, BC 502, BC 511.**

BC 631- Counseling Internship

Three Hours

This is a supervised and evaluated internship. The student will work under an approved biblical counselor and actually engage in the counseling ministry. He must complete a minimum of 25 one-hour sessions. Further the student must demonstrate his developing skill to understand and apply biblical principles in a very practical and specific way to the issues of life.

Prerequisite BC 621

Georgia Baptist Theological Seminary recommends that our Biblical Counseling Majors pursue certification with the National Association of Nouthetic Counselors (NANC). The Master of Arts in Biblical Counseling program is designed to help prepare the student to sit the theological and counseling exams required for NANC certification.

BIBLICAL STUDIES

Old Testament

OT 400 - Old Testament Survey

No Credit

A non-credit course designed for students who are deficient in Bible background.

OT 500 - Advanced Old Testament Introduction

Three Hours

General introduction to the Old Testament which includes its canon and text, composition, authorship, date, contents of each book, and answers to critical views.

OT 501 - Exposition of the Pentateuch

Three Hours

An exposition of the first five books of the Old Testament. The historical and cultural context will be examined with the theology of each book, emphasizing the truths that are foundational to the rest of the Scriptures.

OT 502 - Exposition of the Historical Books

Three Hours

An exposition of vital theological passages in the books from Joshua through Esther. The historical and cultural context will be examined and the theology and practical value of the divine history will be stressed.

OT 503 - Exposition of Genesis

Two Hours

An exposition of Genesis with emphasis on the Creation, the Fall, the Flood, Babel, the Abrahamic Covenant, and the Patriarchs. The relation of Genesis to the rest of the Word of God will be emphasized.

OT 504 - Exposition of Exodus and Leviticus

Two Hours

The truths of redemption and sanctification revealed in these two books will be explored and their implications to New Testament salvation will be expounded.

OT 505 - Numbers and Deuteronomy

Two Hours

The theology of these two books of the Pentateuch will be expounded and their application to the New Testament believer will be noted.

OT 601 - Exposition of the Poetical Books

Three Hours

The course will examine the nature and interpretation of Hebrew poetry and give an expositional study of the books of Job through Song of Solomon.

OT 602 - Exposition of the Prophetic Books

Three Hours

An expositional study of the prophets and prophecy, giving an overview of the OT Major and Minor Prophets. Emphasis will be placed on the book of Isaiah.

OT 603 - Exposition of Joshua, Judges, and Ruth

Three Hours

An exposition of these three pre-monarchial books will be given to note the development of Israel from its tribal period to preparation for the Hebrew monarchy. The truth of Old Testament revival will be emphasized and the books' application to the believer.

OT 605 - Exposition of Kings and Chronicles

Three Hours

An exposition of the united and divided kingdom periods of Israel, noting the theological significance and timeless truths applicable to our day.

OT 606 - Exposition of the Post-Exilic Books

Two Hours

The books of Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther will be expounded with emphasis on their theology and timeless truths.

OT 607 - Exposition of the Psalms

Two Hours

Hebrew poetry will be studied as it applies to the Psalms. Selected psalms will be expounded that express Messianic themes, worship, spiritual experience, and eschatology.

OT 608 - Exposition of the Wisdom Books

Three Hours

An expositional study of selected portions of Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon. Attention will be paid to the nature of Wisdom Literature and how it can be expounded homiletically.

OT 701 - Exposition of Isaiah

Two Hours

An exposition of Isaiah, dealing with critical theories, but chiefly to open up its rich evangelical truths manifested in the Messiah.

OT 702 - Exposition of Jeremiah and Ezekiel

Three Hours

Jeremiah and Ezekiel will be studied to unfold their rich source of spiritual truths as well as prophetic significance.

OT 703 - Exposition of Daniel

Two Hours

Expository studies in Daniel. The practical and prophetic significance of Daniel will be expounded.

OT 704 - Exposition of the Minor Prophets

Two Hours

The twelve Minor Prophets will be expounded with the theology and practical value of each book examined.

OT 710 - Biblical Hermeneutics

Three Hours

A study of the science of biblical interpretation, emphasizing the grammatical-historical-contextual approach. The interpretation of various literary genres will be studied, and the differences between the approaches of dispensational and covenant theology will be examined. Same as **NT 630**.

OT 840 - Thesis Research

Six Hours

Guidance will be given for the selection of a topic, research, and writing of a Th.M. thesis.

New Testament

NT 400 - New Testament Survey

No Credit

A non-credit course designed for students who are deficient in Bible background.

NT 500 - Advanced New Testament Introduction

Three Hours

A general introduction to the canon and text of the New Testament with a study of the authorship, composition, date, and overall content of each book. Critical attacks will be examined and answered.

NT 501 - Life and Ministry of Christ

Three Hours

A study of the life of Christ, using a harmony of the Gospels approach, yet noting the distinctive features of each book.

NT 502 - Exposition of the Synoptic Gospels

Three Hours

An expository study of the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. The Synoptic Problem will be examined and other issues related to these three Gospels.

NT 503 - Exposition of the Gospel and Epistles of John

Three Hours

An expository study of the rich writings of the Apostle John: John, and 1, 2, 3 John.

NT 601 - The Apostolic Age

Two Hours

An exposition of the book of Acts in its setting in the first century world and its relation to the NT epistles of Paul.

NT 602 - Romans Two Hours

A detailed exposition of the epistle of Paul to the Romans with special emphasis on its teaching on Soteriology. Readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 603 - Exposition of the Corinthian Epistles

Two Hours

The epistles of 1 and 2 Corinthians are expounded with application to the issues in the churches of our day. Readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 604 - Exposition of the Pauline Prison Epistles

Three Hours

The Pauline epistles of Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon will be expounded with an emphasis on the Pauline doctrine of the believer's union with Christ in the Body of Christ. Readings in the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 605 - Exposition of the Thessalonian Epistles

Two Hours

1 and 2 Thessalonians will be expounded, and special attention will be paid to eschatological issues in the epistles. Readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 701 - Exposition of the Pastoral Epistles

Two Hours

The epistles of 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus will be expounded. Selective readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 702 - Exposition of Hebrews and the General Epistles

Three Hours

An exposition of Hebrews, James, 1 and 2 Peter, and Jude. Readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 703 - Exposition of Revelation

Two Hours

An exposition of the book of the Revelation. The different views of interpretation will be examined, arguing for the futurist view. Readings from the best modern commentaries will be assigned.

NT 710 - Biblical Hermeneutics

Three Hours

A study of the science of biblical interpretation, emphasizing the grammatical-historical-contextual approach. The interpretation of various literary genres will be studied, and the differences between the approaches of dispensational and covenant theology will be examined. Same as **OT 630**.

NT 840 - Thesis Research

Six Hours

Guidance will be given for the selection of a topic, research, and writing of a Th.M. thesis.

Biblical Languages

La 501, 502 - Elementary Greek

Three Hours each Semester

A study of the Greek language of the New Testament, including vocabulary, forms, syntax, and translation. The student will be introduced to translating the New Testament. *The student must pass these courses with a grade of "C" or better to go on to La 601*.

La 601 - Intermediate Greek

Three Hours

Deeper study of grammar and syntax with application to the exegesis of the Greek New Testament. The student must pass this course with a grade of "C" or better to go on to La 602.

La 602 - Exegesis of Galatians

Three Hours

The Epistle of Paul to the Galatians will be exegeted and translated using the insights and tools learned in Intermediate Greek. The student must pass this class with a grade of "C" or better to go on to any exegesis class.

La 611 - Elementary Hebrew

Four Hours

A fundamental study of the elements of Classical Hebrew vocabulary, word forms, grammar, and reading. The student must pass this course with a grade of "C" or better to go on to any exegesis course.

La 612- Intermediate Hebrew

Three Hours

A study of Hebrew syntax using an interactive approach to Jonah and Ruth.

La 613 - Exegesis of Micah

Three Hours

An exegesis of the prophecy of Micah, using the basics learned in Elementary Hebrew.

La 701 - Exegesis of Romans

Three Hours

Exegesis of the Epistle to the Romans from the Greek NT with a study of syntax and vocabulary.

La 703 - Exegesis of 1 and 2 Corinthians

Three Hours

Exegesis of the Corinthian epistles from the Greek NT with a study of syntax and vocabulary.

La 704 - Exegesis of Philippians and Colossians

Three Hours

Exegesis of the Epistles of Philippians and Colossians from the Greek NT with the study of syntax and vocabulary.

La 705 - Exegesis of Selected Old Testament Passages

Three Hours

Select Old Testament Hebrew passages will be translated and exegeted from narrative and poetic portions.

FIELD EDUCATION

FE 601-702 - Field Education

No Credit

The M.Div. student must take **Field Education** each semester from his Middler Year until graduation. It entails being involved in an active ministry under the supervision of a pastor. A different ministry must be chosen for each year.

HISTORICAL STUDIES

CH 501 - Ancient and Medieval Church History

Three Hours

An overview of the period of Church History from New Testament times to 1517. Special attention will be given to the Church Fathers, early heretical controversies, the Creeds, Church Councils, and the development of the Medieval Catholic Church. The existence of evangelical groups throughout this time will be noted and traced.

CH 502 - Modern Church History

Three Hours

This covers Church History since the Protestant Reformation (1517 to the present). Special attention will be given to the Reformation, the Puritans, the Evangelical Awakenings, and modern theological developments.

CH 601 - The History of Missions

Two Hours

A survey of the history of Christian missions from NT times to the present. Emphasis will be placed on early British missions, the modern mission movement, faith missions, and missions in our day.

CH 602 - History of Philosophy

Three Hours

The history of the development of human thought from the early Greek nature philosophers to Classic Greek Philosophy, Medieval and Modern Philosophy. Influential thinkers will be noted, the various schools of thought, and their comparison to the Biblical Christian worldview.

CH 701-History of Religion in America

Three Hours

A study of the background and historical development of Christianity in America from the early colonies to the present. Spiritual Awakenings and major denominations will be noted, along with other religious groups.

CH 703 - Baptist History and Distinctives

Three Hours

The doctrine of the Church (Ecclesiology) is studied with an emphasis on the doctrines distinctive to Baptists as well as a survey of Baptist History. Same as **Th 703**.

CH 705 - History of Revival

Two Hours

The history of revival from its principles in the Old and New Testaments through Church History, especially centering in the Evangelical Awakenings that have come since the Reformation. Studied will be the historical backgrounds, leaders, theology, distortions, and effects of Holy Spirit revival.

CH 710 - Historical Theology

Three Hours

A study of the progress of theological dogma as developed in the understanding of the professing Church through history. Heretical controversies will be examined, and the development of various traditional theologies will be noted. Same as **Th 710**.

MISSIONS

Mi 502- Introduction to Missions

Two Hours

The Great Commission as the basis for world missions, the relation of the local church to world evangelism, the definition and qualifications of a missionary, and the biblical principle of indigenous church planting will be studied.

Mi 601 - The History of Missions

Two Hours

A survey of the history of Christian missions from NT times to the present. Emphasis will be placed on early British missions, the modern mission movement, faith missions, and missions in our day.

Mi 602 - Missionary Practicum

One to Three Hours

This course involves the student visiting the mission field, observing and laboring with missionaries, and producing a writing project relating to the experience and a journal of

interviews with the missionaries. Credit will depend on the time, responsibility, and work involved. Academic approval must be secured before the students makes the visit.

Mi 701 - Principles and Methods of Missions

Two Hours

The courses cover the process of a missionary candidate, including commissioning from the local church, choice of a mission board, deputation, preparation for the field spiritually, physically, and financially. Practical projects will be undertaken, such as the making of prayer cards, prayer letters, slide presentations, and display boards.

Mi 702 - Principles and Methods of Missions

Two Hours

The life and ministry of the missionary on the field of labor will be studied, such as principles of church planting, including such specialized ministries as medical work, educational ministries, literature production and distribution, radio outreach, camp ministries, and translation.

PASTORAL STUDIES

PS 501 - Prayer Two Hours

A study of the definitions, methods, purposes, hinderance and needs of prayer. The importance of praying in the Spirit, in the name of Christ, and according to the will of God will be studied, as well as the relation of faith and obedience to prayer.

PS 502 - Biblical Evangelism

Two Hours

A study of the Scriptural basis and proper motivation for the evangelism of the lost. The student will learn that theology affects one's methodology, thus a proper theology of evangelism will be developed, so that the message and methods will be biblical.

PS 601 - Introduction to Biblical Counseling

Three Hours

This course is a basic introduction to biblical counseling distinctives, and techniques. Students will discuss how the Scriptures and Theology form the foundation and essential elements for biblical counseling as contrasted to secular humanistic counseling. The dangers of pop Christian psychology which integrates secular psychology and religion are exposed. Emphasis is placed upon the role of counseling in the ministry of the local church and the biblical qualifications of a counselor. **Same as BC 501.**

PS 602 - Spiritual Warfare

Two Hours

The course deals with the enemies of the Christian (Satan, the flesh, and the world) and the biblical prescription for each. Satan, fallen angels, and demonic powers will be studied as to their reality and nature, but more importantly, the believer's victory in Christ and weapons of warfare to overcome in his life and lead others to deliverance.

PS 603 - Homiletics Two Hours

Instruction will be given in the preparation and delivery of sermons. The importance of preaching in the power of the Holy Spirit will be emphasized. The topical, textual, and expository sermon will be introduced with the emphasis on expository preaching.

PS 604 - Expository Preaching

Two Hours

Expository preaching will be studied in more detail from the text and its exegesis to the sermon and its delivery. The student will be introduced to preaching from the various kinds of biblical literature and genre found in the Old and New Testaments.

PS 701- Pastoral Counseling

Three Hours

This course will help men called to pastoral or biblical counseling ministry to develop a comprehensive plan to implement biblical counseling in the local church. A major part of the course will enable the student to develop a thorough program to train key leaders in the church to counsel biblically and to disciple others. **Same as BC 612.**

PS 702 - Science and the Bible

Three Hours

Genesis 1-11 will be studied from the perspective of Young Earth Creationism, showing how this accords with scientific evidence and provides a foundation for the rest of the Scriptures and a Christian worldview. The biblical and scientific answers will be given to Naturalistic and Theistic Evolution, Uniformitarian Geology, and Old Earth Creationism.

PS 703 - Pastoral Theology

Two Hours

A course designed for those preparing for the pastoral or missionary ministries. Studied will be the call to the ministry, the minister's personal and study life, and practical instruction in the mechanics of ministry, such as baptizing, conducting the Lord's Supper, funerals, weddings, business meetings, building expansion, and other responsibilities of leadership.

PS 705 - Social Ethics Two Hours

A study of the various schools of ethical theory and the basis for a Christian ethic. Modern moral issues will be discussed from a biblical perspective.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

RE 501 - Introduction to Religious Education

Three Hours

An introduction into the history, philosophy, aims, objectives, and curriculum of the education ministries of the church.

RE 502 - History and Philosophy of Christian School

Three Hours

A study of the rise of the Christian School movement and an exposition of the Christian philosophy of education in contrast to secular education in the public government schools.

RE 601 - Religious Education of Children

Two Hours

A study of the church program for children, evangelism of children, and methods and materials for reaching this age group.

RE 602 - Introduction to Youth Work

Two Hours

Focus is on the modern teen-ager, his motivations, and culture. The history of youth organizations and presentation of successful programs will be studied.

RE 603 - Methods and Principles of Christian Education

Three Hours

An outline of principles of teaching as fundamental to effective and productive administration of Christian Education ministries and activities. Principles of learning necessary to assimilation of information and efficient application to life and Christianity will be covered.

RE 604 - Religious Education of Adults

Two Hours

A course on the characteristics, needs, and problems of adults, and the total church program of adult education. Methods and materials of adult work are examined and evaluated. Methods for working with all ages of adults will be discussed.

RE 611- Women Discipling Women

Three Hours

This course is for women majoring in biblical counseling and addresses the development of a women's ministry within the local church that will provide a biblical discipleship program for women. Topics will include specific counseling problems common to women such as the feminist influence, modesty issues, misrepresentations about submission, the role of women in the local church, idolatrous emotional attachments, bitterness, unforgiving spirit, not having a gentle and quiet spirit and keys to developing family unity and communication skills.

RE 701 - Sunday School Administration

Two Hours

A study of the total program of organization, administration, and outreach of the Sunday School. The requirements, qualifications, duties, and training of teachers and leaders, as well as the role of the pastor, Christian Education director, and Sunday School superintendent are examined.

RE 702 - Organization and Administration of a Christian Day SchoolThree Hours

Principles of organization and administration of a Christian School are explored. Purpose, goals, problems, and practical information are given as to the everyday working of a Christian Day School.

RE 704 - Teaching Bible in Church and School

Two Hours

A practical course in the steps in the education process, the seven laws of learning, the teaching methods of Christ, and the application of these principles in a local church or school.

RE 705 - Curriculum Development

Three Hours

A study of the general principles of curriculum building for a total church Christian education program. Materials for the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Leadership Training Program, Weekday Clubs, etc., will be analyzed.

SACRED MUSIC STUDIES

SM 501 - Introduction to Music

Two Hours

Introduction to the scales, intervals, and chord structures as well as song leading. A Christian philosophy of music will be taught.

SM 502 - Song Leading

Two Hours

A study of the techniques of gospel song leadership in relation to the congregation and to the choir. The fundamentals of music that are necessary to being an effective song leader and the procedures in interpretation and choral work are taught.

THEOLOGICAL STUDIES

Th 501 - Systematic Theology I

Three Hours

After introducing the science of theology, the doctrines of the Bible (Bibliology), God (Theology Proper), and Angels (Angelology) will be studied.

Th 502 - Systematic Theology II

Three Hours

This semester covers the doctrines of the Holy Spirit (Pneumatology) and Christ (Christology).

Th 601 - Systematic Theology III

Three Hours

The doctrines of Man (Anthropology), Sin (Hamartiology), and Salvation (Soteriology) will be studied. The Doctrines of Grace will be emphasized. Required for all degree programs.

Th 602 - Systematic Theology IV

Three Hours

The doctrine of Last Things (Eschatology) will be taught, including Death and the Afterlife, the Second Coming of Christ, and the final state of the Saved and the Lost. Required for all degree programs.

Th 603 - Bibliology Two Hours

The doctrine of the Bible will be studied, including its inspiration, authority, authenticity, perspicuity, canonicity, preservation, and interpretation.

Th 604 - Theology Proper and the Trinity

Three Hours

The doctrine of God, His existence, attributes, sovereignty, and triunity will be studied. Emphasis will be placed on the doctrine of the Trinity and its importance to Christianity and the Christian.

Th 605 - Christology

Three Hours

A thorough study of the doctrine of the Person and Work of Christ, including His deity, incarnation, humanity, impeccability, states, offices, atonement, resurrection, ascension, present session, and future glory.

Th 606 - Pneumatology

Three Hours

The doctrine of the Holy Spirit will be studied, including His deity, personality, Old Testament ministry, relation to the Son, advent, present ministry in the Church and the believer, His working in revival, and future activity. The question of spiritual gifts will be examined and the Charismatic and Signs and Wonders movements evaluated.

Th 607 - Soteriology

Three Hours

The doctrine of salvation will be studied from eternity to eternity, including with it the truths of election, predestination, calling, regeneration, conversion (repentance and faith), justification, adoption, assurance, sanctification, and glorification.

Th 608 - Ecclesiology

Three Hours

A study of the doctrine of the Church. The Church, the Body of Christ, will be studied positionally and particularly in its manifestation in the local church. Examined will be the nature and membership of a church, its polity, the ordinances of baptism and the Lord Supper, its authority, officers, relation to the State, mission, hope, and future.

Th 610 - Eschatology

Three Hours

The study centers on the Second Coming of Christ and related events, the Millennium, the final doom of the wicked, and the final bliss of the redeemed. The Dispensational and Covenant positions will be compared and the rapture positions and the millennial views will be examined.

Th 620 - Apologetics

Three Hours

The development of a biblical philosophy concerning the rational defense of the Christian faith. The evidential and presuppositional approaches will the compared and evaluated. The questions of the existence of God, the inspiration of the Bible, the historicity of Jesus Christ and His resurrection, and actuality of miracles will be addressed. Opposing worldviews, such as naturalism, relativism, and anti-biblical theism will answered.

Th 630 – Introduction to Philosophy

Three Hours

A study of the definition, scope, and purpose of philosophy. Major philosophical systems are presented, along with their categories, problems, and solutions, as well as an introduction to the great philosophers. A Christian worldview based on divine revelation will be compared with human wisdom. This course is designed to aid the student in developing a biblical worldview.

Th 701 - Old Testament Theology

Three Hours

A biblical theology based on its development in the Old Testament history of redemption. Biblical theology will be defined, major views of biblical theology will be critiqued, and the OT will be examined for its theological content.

Th 702 - New Testament Theology

Three Hours

A biblical theology based on the development in the New Testament history of redemption. Such themes as the Kingdom of God will be studied.

Th 703 - Baptist History and Distinctives

Three Hours

The doctrine of the Church (Ecclesiology) is studied with an emphasis on the doctrines distinctive to Baptists as well as a survey of Baptist History. Same as **CH 703**.

Th 710 - Historical Theology

Three Hours

A study of the progress of theological dogma as developed in the understanding of the professing Church through history. Heretical controversies will be examined, and the development of various traditional theologies will be noted. Same as **CH 710**.

Th 840 - Thesis Research

Six Hours

Guidance will be given for the selection of a topic, research, and writing of a Th.M. thesis.
